The school district's grading program, Home Access Center, will allow parents the ability to access their child's grades using a provided username and password (Ben Lippert and Rene Embrey, HAC Facilitators-ongoing).

Teachers will routinely contact parents on an individual basis by phone or e-mail to communicate about their child's progress (Principals and Classroom teachers - ongoing).

Junior High North will provide report cards to parents every grading period to show their child's academic progress (Lesa Speck, registrar-quarterly).

Parents are encouraged to visit the Junior High North Parent Center, which will consist of information to promote and support responsible parenting as well as how to engage in activities that will use community resources to strengthen school programs. It will also include the comprehensive and coordinated FACE plan (Jessica Moserongoing).

Junior High North will consider recruiting alumni from the school to create a parent/alumni advisory committee to provide advice and guidance for school improvement in the school's instructional program (Jessica Moser-ongoing).

To ensure the FACE plan is comprehensive, coordinated, and aligns with the school's improvement plan, there will be at least one representative who serves on both committees and acts as a liason for the two groups. The goals that will be aligned between school improvement and the FACE plan will be determined by a needs

assessment that will be given to parents each spring; the results will be used to plan the following school year. Goals that will be aligned this year include productive and plentiful communication with families and keeping track of students' academics and mental health, especially during times of blended or remote learning (Jessica Moserongoing).
